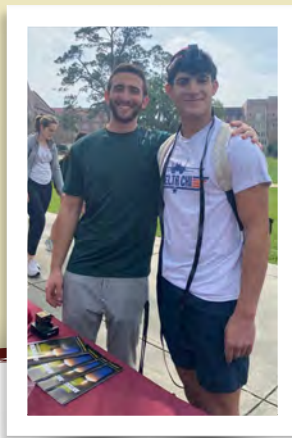
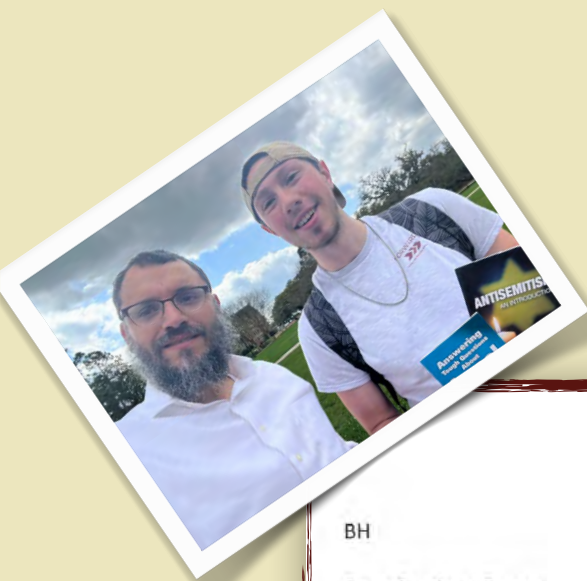

Dear Gracious Donor,

I would personally like to thank you for your continued support of our Chabad House. As a student that frequents Chabad, the fire had a devastating impact on our community, especially on the Oirechman Family. In spite of this tragic event, the Rabbi and Rebbetzin have continued to provide a 'home away from home' for FSU students. I believe a story from the Midrash puts the experience faced by our Chabad in perspective.

Last week's Parsha was Beshalch, my Bar Mitzvah portion. In it, we read how the Jews crossed the Red Sea. Before they crossed; however, the Jews seemed trapped. They were surrounded on all sides — Egyptians on one and the Sea on the other. How did we react? The Midrash says we were split into four camps.

The first group said "come let us take our weapons and fight the Egyptians! We did not leave Egypt to die!" Another group said "Oy Gevult, G-d led us out of Egypt to die in the desert? We're Schvitzn! Let's go back to Egypt." The third group said "Oy, we can't take it, let us throw ourselves into the water and die." Finally, the fourth group said "come, let us pray to G-d." Which group was right?

None of them! Moses rebuked all of them. Moses said "Fear not; stand by and see the salvation of G-d which He will show you today. For as you have seen Egypt this day, you shall not see them again, forever. G-d shall fight for you, and you shall be silent. (Exodus 14:13). Moses's response to this situation was action. He didn't give up, fight, kvetch, or pray; he took directed action to overcome situational limitations. What followed was a miracle, namely the splitting of the Red Sea. Herein lies the lesson.

After the Chabad House burned down, it was as if we were exiled to our own "Egypt." Rabbi and the Rebbetzin could have reacted like any of these four camps of Jews. But they didn't. They took action. We have daily minions at 7 AM as well as events for Shabbos and the Chaggim, because of your help. Your efforts have allowed us take action, recover from this tragedy, and trek forwards. For that, I would like to personally thank you. Thank you for helping me and other FSU Students overcome our limitations to take action.
